#### Extra classroom support in 2020

Our Student Support Officers (SSOs) play a key role in supporting student learning. Last year we increased SSO support time in classrooms for all classes from reception to year 4 to focus on literacy and numeracy support for all learners. In 2020 we are extending that support for all classes across the school which equates to at least 2 hours extra support a week. During these times SSOs will be working alongside teachers, supporting individual students and small groups.

#### 2019 NAPLAN Snapshot

Teachers work very hard here at Belair PS and our students are achieving great results, as is evidenced in our Annual Report emailed home to all families with this newsletter.

# Year 7 NAPLAN Comment

We had 75 students participate in the year 7 NAPLAN in 2019. 92% achieved the SEA in Reading and 90% in Numeracy which was our best result in both for the past 3 years. These strong results were backed up with the progress in Numeracy showing 86% of students in the middle and upper progress range and in Reading with 88% of students in the middle and upper progress range. We also had 52% of students achieving the upper bands of NAPLAN Reading which is above the average of the past 3 years. 42% of students achieved the upper bands of Numeracy which is also above our 3 year average.

#### Year 5 NAPLAN Comment

72 year 5 students participated in the 2019 NAPLAN. 84% achieved the SEA in Reading and 71% in Numeracy. 88% of students achieved middle and upper progress in Reading with 40% being identified within the upper progress group. The numeracy progress results and higher band achievement were below previous years along with the participation rate of 86%. There were 11 students who did not sit the numeracy assessment, 10 of these students were above the SEA in the PAT M assessment with 8 being significantly above. This group will be monitored in 2020. Year 3 NAPLAN Comment

We had 82 year 3 students participate in the 2019 assessment and once again there were some very pleasing individual student results with 67% of students achieving in the higher bands in Reading and 49% in Numeracy. Outstandingly 96% of the cohort achieved the SEA in Reading, by far the best result of previous years. 96% of students of students also achieved the SEA in Numeracy, of which 49% achieved the highest 2 bands, another great achievement from this group. There are no progress rates for our year 3 students as this was their first year of NAPLAN.

The Standard of Educational Achievement 'SEA' refers to the standard that the Department for Education expects children to be at or above for year levels 1 to 10 across the school system.

#### 2020 NAPLAN dates

This year we will be undertaking the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) testing in online mode with the exception of year 3 writing. The online test dates will run between May 12 and May 22.

## Staffing update

Congratulations to Claire Oliphant who has won the School Improvement Coordinator position at Belair PS for 2020. Claire's role will see her working across the school on Monday and Tuesday each week, leading and supporting literacy and numeracy initiatives from reception to year 7. She will remain as room 4 classroom teacher on Wednesday, Thursday and Fridays. We are pleased to announce that Carly Roworth will take up the class teaching position on Monday and Tuesday for the rest of this year.

We also welcome Bec Dwyer to our Front Office admin team as full-time Finance Officer and Maddie Day to the SSO classroom support team.

# **SCIENCE**

Science has kicked off for 2020 with all students having one specialist lesson a week. Reception students have been exploring the playground discovering what things are made of and expanding their vocabulary by describing how they feel to touch. Year 1 students are investigating what happens when we bend and stretch different materials and objects. "It's all mixed up" in year 2 as they experiment with different types of mixtures and creating some in the science room. Changing states of matter by heating and cooling is keeping the year 3/4 students busy. All 4/5 students are investigating packaging materials in preparation for designing a package for a fragile gift and sending it via post and courier. Conducting experiments to investigate physical and chemical change in materials and investigating which ones can be reversed is our inquiry





for year 6 and 7 students. The science learning space is now all set up with resources moved from the library to the science area.

Eight students, Brodie, Lily, Taj, Imogen, Mia, Maya, Georgia and Kaiden, from year 6 and 7 applied for and were successful as our first lab assistants, or 'lab rats' as they like to be known.

They will help set up equipment, trial experiments and organise displays.



# **ASSEMBLY REPORT**

Rooms 1 and 2 hosted week 4 assembly. It was based on the theme, people who break school rules go to court. Students worked in small groups to write and perform short skits or movies about certain school rules that are often broken. Other students worked on scripting and performing in short court scenes with the students who broke the rules in the previous scenes. The four students in charge of the overall presentation, formed a dynamic team who confidently communicated ideas and requirements to small and large groups. The assembly gave everyone a chance to build connections with each other and demonstrate teamwork skills and creativity. It was a great success, and everyone had a great time.

# PASTORAL SUPPORT WORKER

Dear Families,

The Unhealthy And Unrealistic Pursuit Of Endless Fun And Happiness.

"We have been seduced by the idea that having endless fun and being constantly happy is not only desirable it's attainable.

I worry about the damage this idea is causing and I fear for our children as rapidly increasing numbers of adults become complicit in the countless ways and means used, each and every day, to convince them that if they're not constantly happy and having fun, then something is wrong.

Fun. "Have fun", is as frequent a parting salutation as, "see you later" or indeed, "bye." Nowhere is this more apparent than in primary schools where countless thousands of children slide from the seats of cars to head into classrooms supported by the warm tones of parents entreating them to, "have fun."

This request is reinforced at the end of the day when reentry into the family car is met with the hopeful question, "did you have fun?"

Work. There was a time when the expectation was that you would go to school and work hard. Perhaps that expectation was a little harsh and implied that school was a cold and brittle place to which little children went to toil and mine for information.

Schools today are certainly not cold and harsh. They are warm, welcoming environments to which teachers and students commit much time and effort to reflect the colour, movement and spectacle of learning.

Yet, amidst this stimulating environment the requirement for work, effort and application remain as much a necessity for learning as they have always been.

So, would it help to ask children to go to school prepared to have fun working hard? I think it would and I think they should be occasionally reminded to work hard even if they are not having fun.

Life isn't always 'fun'. The incessant bombardment of our children with the notion that constant fun and happiness is their rightful expectation has markedly reduced their ability to deal with the everyday trials and tribulations of life. We have made fun the end point of all endeavours. Consequently, when fun ceases so does endeavour, and with it go all the associated benefits.

So convincing have we been in marketing this idea of perpetual fun to our children that too many react as though their rights have been violated when teachers fail to supply a constant stream of it.

Gaining self-respect. Children can, and many do, labour in the pursuit of noble causes. They can toil to reach a higher goal. They can suffer for the sake of self-betterment. And when they do, they transcend the fleeting experience of fun and reach the promised land of self-respect.

What can we do about it?. Well, let's first of all choose not to be unwitting partners in this unsustainable and destructive pursuit. And secondly, when our children complain that we are not supplying enough fun and happiness let's stay calm, remain confident, ask and expect them to solider on, and comfort ourselves with the knowledge that along with the many opportunities for fun and happiness we do offer, we also invite them to participate in the adversity that has, and always will, shape character.

I believe it's time for us to get off the fun and happiness bandwagon and realise that our effectiveness as adults, parents and teachers must not be measured by how well we make our children happy but how well we empower our children to make themselves happy."

Well, that has me thinking! I am very guilty of the "Have fun" parting salutation ©.




# PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

#### NO STOPPING ZONES -

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings.






#### NO PARKING ZONES -

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible.

No Parking zones are to ensure a quick and smooth turnover of vehicles.



#### **CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -**

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

#### SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.

#### SPEED LIMITS -

Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25 kph, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).








#### INTERSECTION OR T-INTERSECTION

(Restricted Area)

You cannot park within 10m of the intersection.



# **CROSSING PLACES (driveways)**

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

#### FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

#### **DOUBLE PARKING** -

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.



# BECAUSE CHILDREN ARE NOT LITTLE ADULTS YOU NEED TO DRIVE WITH CARE AND CONCENTRATION NEAR SCHOOLS

#### WHY ARE CHILDREN AT RISK

- Their size means that sometimes they cannot easily see or be seen in traffic.
- Parked vehicles, light poles and other street furniture all block a child's view of the road and also make it difficult for drivers to see them.
- Their concentration is limited and they are easily distracted.
- Their actions are often spontaneous and unthinking (that's why the will dart out on to the road to fetch a ball or weave about when riding their bikes) without checking to see if vehicles or pedestrians are coming.
- · Their sight is not fully developed, especially their ability to "scan" for things.
- They are lacking the ability to estimate the speed of vehicles, the gap between vehicles, where a vehicle is coming from or how far way it is.



# HOW YOU CAN HELP YOUR CHILDREN

#### **FOR UNDER 5 YEARS**

Make sure your children have reliable supervision at all times when in or near traffic, especially when crossing roads.

#### FOR 5 TO 8 YEARS

Help your children to become familiar with all aspects of the road environment – signs, traffic lights and crossing places.

Teach them cycling skills in a safe area – in a park or playground etc.

If they are riding a bike to school, plan a safe route for them to take

#### FOR 9 TO 12 YEARS

Take the time to explain the road rules in simple terms e.g.: Right of way, what to do at intersections etc.

Go for blke rides with your children to make sure they have safe cycling behaviour
